April 29, 1942 - December 1, 2022

Charlotte Madison Dixon of Dacula, Georgia, passed away in a Lawrenceville, Georgia, hospital surrounded by friends and family on December 1, 2022, after a brief illness. Charlotte was born in Gadsden, Alabama, the daughter of the late John Webster Madison, III, and Myrtle Tolleson Madison. After graduation from Gadsden High School in 1960, she attended the University of Alabama. When she married she moved to Mountain View, Georgia, and then Stone Mountain. Later she moved to Dacula to be near her daughters. She retired from the Internal Revenue Service after a thirty-year career. Preceding her in death were her parents; her brother, James Madison; brother-in-law Larry Clevenger, and her beloved dog, Benny. Charlotte is survived by her daughters, Kismet Scarborough and Cynthia Feeney; grandchildren Julia Feeney Pruitt (Garrett) and John Feeney; sister, Margaret Madison Clevenger; brothers John W. Madison IV (Kathy), William Madison (Paula), and David Madison (Myra). Additionally, she left her favorite niece, Courtney Madison Rakestraw (Joshua) and nephews, Michael Clevenger, Seth Madison, and Mark Cassidy (Tammy). She also leaves behind grandnephew Zander Rakestraw and grandniece Haidyn Rakestraw. Dear to her heart were special friends, Kenny White; Jackie Strickland, who was like a daughter to her; and Gail D. Mullinax, who was like a sister. She is mourned by a host of friends and relatives. Charlotte was a collateral descendant of President James Madison and attended several reunions at Montpelier, the former president's family estate. She was a 34-year kidney transplant recipient, an Episcopalian,

and a member of Mensa and the Daughters of the American Revolution. She was a die-hard Alabama football fan. A memorial celebration of life will be announced at a later date.
