I will always remember attending one of her Red Hat Society luncheons, dressed in the pink garb she'd managed to talk me into. Watching her that day, I realized her ability to converse with everyone and to make everyone feel included. She did something for me then that no other adult had, she invited me into her life and encouraged me to participate in it. I will miss her dearly.
